Poetic and literary terms will be defined. Personal writing, analytical writing, persuasive writing, writing about literature, and research writing will be assigned.

Grading Policy

Tests/projects—40% Quizzes -30% Homework – 15% Classwork – 15%

Class participation is a component of your CLASSWORK grade for this class; it is highly valued. Many of the readings may seem very obscure, and for this reason, class participation is necessary for you to gain confidence in your ability to grapple with difficult texts.

Obviously, absences will affect your ability to participate, which in turn WILL IMPACT your classwork grade.

Homework is graded on thoughtfulness and effort. The quality of your responses is the focus. Classwork and homework constitute a large percentage of your grade. If classwork is assigned, it is due during the class period. If homework is assigned, it is due the following day at the beginning of the class period.

Homework and classwork are graded on a check mark system:

- \rightarrow ($\sqrt{+}$) equals full credit.
- \rightarrow ($\sqrt{}$) equals 85%.
- \rightarrow $\sqrt{-}$ (75%).
- \triangleright a minus (-) equals 25%.
- ➤ Work not completed receives a 0%.

> LATE WORK will NOT BE ACCEPTED.

NOTE: Take Home Quizzes will sometimes be assigned. If a take home quiz is late, 10 points will be deducted for each day it is late. (After 3 days, it will no longer be accepted and will earn a 0%).

Projects and Essays are given advanced due dates, and it is important to pass in this work on time. Every effort will be made to help students before the assignment is due. Late projects and essays will lose 10 points per day late, unless there are legitimate extenuating circumstances.
